Visit to the Aga Khan Centre

In June, Riaz was provided with a tour of the Aga Khan Centre in London. The multi-storey building houses the Aga Khan Foundation and two academic institutions. The library houses a vast range of books related to Islamic history and practice and the Gallery displayed historic Qur'anic scripts from Central Asia. A particular feature of the centre were the multiple garden areas which were themed on different areas of the world. The visit enabled Riaz to hear more about the Ismaili tradition within Islam.







RE Conference

In June, Ramila and Riaz attended a Religious Education conference hosted by the Diocesan Board of Education. They were joined by Nicole, our Humanist faith practitioner. The event gave the centre an opportunity to engage with Anglican schools in Leicestershire and to highlight the range of programmes we have available. In the afternoon, colleagues took part in a panel discussion where they were able to focus on how to improve the quality of religious and worldviews education.

The Centre's work in delivering the Prevent strategy in Leicester and Leicestershire continued to be held in high regard both nationally and internationally.

Corporate

The Open Societies Foundation funded project, "Cops,

Communities, Consent" completed its programme of work, including focus groups, Police Expo, RISE (Resiliency Interfaith Skills and Employability) programmes, and Community Cases



seminars, engaging over 2500 students.

Co-operate

The Centre continued as the Near Neighbours hub for Leicester, delivering grants, capacity building and personal development sessions.



We continued our funded

project to develop the safeguarding capacity of faith-based organisations in Leicester and Leicestershire, developing action plans based on the baseline audit conducted for us by the NSPCC, and delivering bespoke safeguarding training in collaboration with partners including Leicester City Football Club, the University of Leicester, and the REIGN collective.

Annual General Meeting

The Keynote Speaker for our Annual General Meeting on 11th June was Professor Andrew Davies, Professor of Public Religion at the University of Birmingham, and Director of the Edward Cadbury

Centre for the Public Understanding of Religion. He spoke on 'The Future of Inter-religious Relations'. He recognised that this year had been a challenging time for inter-religious relations, with the demise of the Inter Faith Network for the UK, a rise in community tensions, the Middle East conflict and the complex political context. Traditional approaches to interfaith had failed in some ways. He suggested that too much interfaith work had been based on rational interaction and had been too academic and clinical. It had also perhaps been based too much on individual friendships and cited a number of challenges and flaws in interfaith work including theological flaws (e.g. too theological and not focussed enough on lived experience) and operational flaws (e.g. insufficiently representative and insufficiently inclusive).



He went on to talk about what a new approach might look like:

- Shared purposeful experiences in order to combat shared issues common to many religious communities such as extremism, disdain for life, hatred and racism etc. Faith should bring hope, opportunity, and purpose in the world. As people of faith, we can be united around working together.
- Shared values: As people of faith, we share many values, and this is something which should be promoted.
- Shared stories of how faith has shaped our journeys.
- Shared opportunities: Together people of faith can have a greater influence in policy terms and a greater impact in practical terms.
- Shared endeavour—working alongside each other, confronting challenges.
- Shared benefits—a world more at peace with itself, a world in which we can be ourselves freely, a world which recognises religion as a fact of life without privileging any tradition, a world where inspirational leaders with faith and values can flourish.

We are very grateful to Andrew for taking the time to come and speak to us. It was a most interesting and insightful evening.
