


Cathryn says, 'I am looking forward to continuing this work and sharing my experience of Interfaith on a wider scale in my new role at St Philip's Centre.'





# **Safeguarding Project**

The St Philip's Centre hosted another training session run by the REIGN collective on 1<sup>st</sup> October. It was on understanding how children are groomed for child sexual exploitation. As ever, it was a professionally delivered, highly engaging and challenging session. As well as the personal testimonies, what I found particularly useful were the suggestions for how to respond if you think someone had been groomed and is being exploited. Do not seek to correct or control or condemn. Seek to understand and explore. The picture here gives some suggested questions. They resonated with taking a coaching approach to any complex problem. I'd thoroughly recommend this training.

The visit included stops at saree shops, utensil stores, Indian vegetable markets, and a taste of traditional Indian sweets.
