
for the first time, people of different faiths coming together under one roof. We are currently planning sessions in Suffolk and Norfolk for the new academic year.

Mars



On Tuesday 20th May, Revd Jonathan Holder, Revd Lesley Moseley and I held a theological discussion in Leicester Cathedral. The Cathedral is currently hosting Mark Jerram's Mars, and this was the focus of our discussion. We had three launch points – war, space exploration and chocolate. A brief comment on each:

Mars is the God of war in the Roman pantheon. We live in an age of much debated and sadly forgotten conflicts – what are distinctively Christian perspectives on the associated ethical issues? We discussed pacifism, conscription, power, the evolution of military technology and environmental degradation.

Human beings talk about colonising Mars – but if we do, will we bring all the injustices, hubris and selfishness that characterises how we treat the Earth? Is there a Christian perspective on space exploration? What about emergent technologies, such as AI? How do we use these new powerful tools in an ethically and environmentally responsible way?

As the advert puts it, "A Mars a day helps you work, rest, and play." But in an era of over-consumption and shrinkflation, how are Christians to live? Gluttony is to be avoided – but so is a joyless existence. Even moderation can be taken too far.

The focus was the conversation – we weren't there to solve anything, but to think theologically – living out the command to love God with all our minds. The conclusion we reached was the imperative for each generation to think afresh how to live out their Christian discipleship in an ever-changing world.

Corporate Work

CoiN in colleges!

An eventful month has witnessed the launch of our new programme entitled CoiN which is an acronym for 'community integration'. It is a scheme for young people to boost their confidence, awareness and abilities to promote inclusive social cohesion. The programme is funded by the Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government via Leicester City Council. It began with 18 students at Gateway College followed by a similar beginning at The City of Leicester College (TCOLC) with 21 students. In the same month, we ran further CoiN sessions for young peer volunteers at the Eyres Monsell Club for Young People.

The sessions enabled participants to learn about the depth and breadth of religious and belief diversity in Leicester as well as to have powerful encounters with some of our faith practitioners which included a Sikh university student. All the engagements enabled two-way dialogue and over the coming weeks, field visits such as the 'Golden Mile' will take place to enable participants to connect with a broader range of learning. One highlight of CoiN was a talk on fame, racism and addiction at TCOLC by George Parris – a former Premier League footballer for West Ham United.

Community engagement

Riaz and Tom visited Masjid al Husayn to see some of the latest developments to the building and to hear about some of their upcoming programmes.

Safeguarding

We have continued to work with the All-Party Parliamentary Group (APPG) on Safeguarding in Faith Communities as they have produced some written policy briefings on areas of improvement. Similar efforts to produce good practice guidance for the sector have taken place with Learning Outside the Classroom.



Vivienne Froggatt and I were invited by Judi Ogelsby from the Somali Community Parents Association -SOCOPA - to a pre-Near Neighbours event at the Dahab Eritrean restaurant on Churchgate.

The event was hosted by the Hiddo group which - initiated by SOCOPA - was set up by Somali mothers to rejuvenate Somali culture - passing on traditions to the younger generation through a variety of events and get togethers.

The Hiddo ladies have recently started working with an Eritrean group and hosted the evening as an introduction to Eritrean culture and food event. Two small groups came together along with some refugee and asylum seeker women who have been engaged with THRIVE.

This was a great opportunity to meet and chat with people from different cultures, sample Eritrean cuisine and experience traditional Somali dancing.
