Connecting Communities

In December we ran two 'Christmas is Coming' sessions; the first at St Mary's Church, Humberstone and the second at St Philip's Church, Leicester. Whilst making clay Christmas trees, participants talked about what Christmas traditions they had grown up with and what changes they had seen either through time or from different cultural perspectives.

Conversations explored:

- The commercialisation of Christmas and in particular whether it not only hid the true meaning of Christmas, but also robbed children of some of the simpler joys that older participants remembered – how it was a treat to get an orange or a piece of chocolate in a stocking, the fun of playing games together and watching or listening to shows as a family.
- Different food traditions and especially where cultural background influenced what was eaten for Christmas dinner.
- The decline in church attendance including how the change in preaching following WW2 from 'fire and brimstone' to 'love' contributed to this.
- What presents people were hoping to get
- What preparations were being made for Christmas
- What church services would be attended
- How being in an ethnically diverse area impacted on Christmas services
- Family visits, interactions, and tensions

Both sessions were lively, interesting and very messy!

Education

2026 has kicked off at a fast pace for the Education Team, with January packed full of activity. We started the year by delivering our Religion and Belief Roadshows, bringing interactive learning into schools and giving pupils the chance to explore different faiths in a really hands-on way.

One teacher from Mansfield summed up the experience perfectly:

"The opportunity for children to see and touch various artefacts; also, the children benefit enormously from speaking to members who practice faiths or beliefs so that they have a greater understanding of these."

We've also had several school visits where pupils spent time at a place of worship, followed by creative, faith-based activities back in the classroom. Through art and crafts, children were able to explore what they'd learned and really embed their understanding of the faith they visited.

On top of this, the team delivered workshops on Judaism and Hinduism, and supported visits to a Mosque, Gurdwara, and Jain Centre. These experiences gave pupils the chance to ask questions, meet people from different faith communities, and learn in a way that's engaging, memorable, and fun.

It's been a strong start to the year, and we're looking forward to continuing this work and creating more meaningful learning experiences throughout 2026.

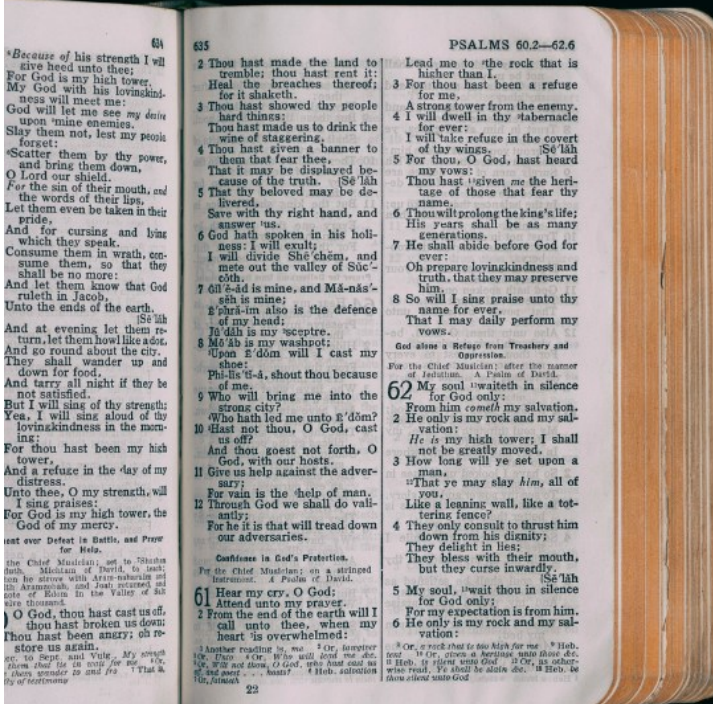


Preaching at Easter with Jewish people in mind
